





What are Degree Apprenticeships?

Degree Apprenticeships are a recent government development. Apprentices will split their time between university study and the workplace and will be employed throughout – gaining a full bachelors or masters degree from a top university, while earning a wage and getting real on-the-job experience in their chosen profession.

Higher Apprentices are already able to study to degree level as part of their apprenticeship but Degree Apprenticeships will go further. The degree will be an integral part of the apprenticeship. Designed by employers and universities to make sure it is relevant for the skills that industry is looking for.

A degree with no fees!

The cost of course fees will be shared between government and employers, meaning that the apprentice can earn a full bachelors or even masters degree without paying any fees.

Who are they for?

As well as being suitable for school leavers as an alternative route to gaining a degree, the new qualifications are suitable for existing employees looking to progress in their career.



Animal care worker

Salary range: £11,000 to £15,000 or more

Animal care workers look after animals in places like kennels, rescue centres or sanctuaries.



Animal technician

Salary range: £15,000 to £40,000

Animal technicians look after animals in laboratories.



Assistance dog trainer

Salary range: £13,500 to £27,000

Assistance dog trainers and instructors train dogs to help people maintain their independence.



Entry requirements

There are no set requirements, but some employers may ask for qualifications like GCSEs.

Experience of working with animals will help. You could gain this through [voluntary work](#).

Taking a college course in an area like animal care could help you gain some of the skills and knowledge you need in this job.

You could get into this job through an [apprenticeship](#).

Skills required and how your skills match up

What skills are required?

You'll need:

- ✓ the ability to handle animals patiently, gently and confidently
- ✓ the ability to cope with upsetting situations like working with injured or badly treated animals
- ✓ a willingness to do dirty or unpleasant tasks
- ✓ the ability to take responsibility for the duty of care of animals




