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# ENGLISH






# BUSINESS Studies





# OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT



Gracie Osman attended the National Individual Athetics Championships in February at the Sheffield Institute of Sport. This was a chance for Gracie to compete against elite young athletes across the UK in long jump. It was such an exciting competition, as Gracie was third going into the last round of jumps. She was outjumped early in the last round, which meant she had dropped down to fourth and out of the medals. But, she responded with her best jump of the day with 5.29m and regaining third place and a bronze medal!

The final event of the winter season was the National Pentathlon and a trip back up to Sheffield. On a day of high emotions, Gracie produced some of her best runs, jumps and throws of her short career to date with personal best's (pb's) in the 60m hurdles, shot put and 800m. With her high jump and long jump both very close to pb's, it led to a huge points tally of 3170, which broke her Winchester club's indoor record that had stood for 17 years! Gracie came away with a silver medal and memories that will last a lifetime.

Hopefully, this sets Gracie up for the 2023 outdoor season with her main aims of attending the English Schools Championships for Long Jump and the English Schools Pentathlon, where a top four finish in the pentathlon would see her represent England in November.


